Because of budgetary influences beyond our control, we have been cut to the bare bone and will have to cut more. We know that each reduction hurts. They affect people. I ask, what would you have us do? Where are we to cut? This is what we face each and every day. I understand and

But when we do attempt to right the ship, chart the course and make these calls, we are criticized and people react as if this is the first they have heard of the need for changes.

Again, as I stated at the assembly, we must all do our part to focus on all the wonderful things that have taken place at our University recently. We should highlight and share the positive aspects of our University and the accomplishments of our outstanding people.

It is my pledge as President, on behalf of my leadership team, we will continue to communicate and do so in a positive and constructive manner. We will invest in our programs and services that will further place WIU on the leading edge and position our university for growth. We will continue to provide a world-class, high-quality, and well-rounded educational experience. We take pride in the academic excellence, value and affordability that we provide. We will work with the appropriate constituencies to implement innovative academic restructuring.

We are beginning to witness the success of our innovative thinking and efforts. As Interim Director of Admissions Jason Woods recently reported, enrollment trends for fiscal year 2019 are outperforming the expectations from this past March. This is good news.

While we expect to have more new students than originally predicted, we are still projected to deficit spend again this year, assuming we receive no additional state funding. Ncuv'{gct."vj g"Wpkxgtukv{øu"crrtqrtkcvgf" expenditures exceeded revenues by approximately \$4 million. This is not sustainable.

Yesterday, our Budget Director, Letisha Trepac, sent a letter to the University community outlining measures to help the University decrease the amount we will deficit spend this year. Decreasing expenditures must be accompanied by increasing revenue. We must grow enrollment, and increase retention and graduation rates. We must enhance and diversify our revenue streams. I will be going to Springfield in the coming weeks to continue advocating for increased funding, including appropriated funds, deferred maintenance and capital projects.
